



PCA Policy Reminders...

Any employee that has not submitted hours for 120 days or more <u>MUST</u> have a new background check run before they can return to work with their client. If hours are submitted without a current background study on file, the PCA will not be paid.

Per the State of Minnesota, PCA's must submit time and activity documentation to the provider within 30 days of working. If we do not have timesheets during this timeframe, you will not get paid until we get reimbursement from the State. This could take up to 6 weeks.

March is National Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month

In 1987, President Ronald Reagan declared March as National Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month. The proclamation called for people to provide understanding, encouragement and opportunities to help persons with developmental disabilities to lead productive and fulfilling lives.

This class of disabilities can refer to impairments in learning and behavior, such as autism, attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder, and impairments in physical and/ or intellectual functioning such as cerebral palsy, spina bifida, and Down syndrome. The campaign seeks to raise awareness about including people with developmental disabilities in all facets of community life. It also creates awareness of the difficulties that people with disabilities still face in fitting into the communities in which they live.

Changes reflecting growing understanding and encouragement can be seen on both the state and federal levels. President Obama reinforced this change when he signed Rosa's Law in 2010, removing outdated and derogatory terminology that appeared in earlier federal legislation.

Society also has answered the call to action. Employers have discovered that persons with developmental disabilities can be reliable, hard-working employees that meet or exceed expectations. Teachers promote acceptance and empathy through character education. The entertainment industry portrays persons with disabilities, such as Down syndrome or autism, more positively and accurately.

Challenges to full inclusion still exist, though. Many capable workers remain unemployed. Lack of understanding causes hurt feelings. Fiscal problems, particularly Medicaid cuts, threaten needed programs and services. You can assist persons with disabilities by offering job opportunities, inviting community participation, supporting special events, donating time or money, and simply teaching your children that each person has a special gift to contribute.
